Fig. 1. Number of Corresponding Members by country, 2018




Fig. 2. Spatial location of Corresponding Members and Steering Committee Members

2. A brief summary of the topics addressed at meetings and the findings

IGU Thematic Conference, Bucharest/Tulcea ROMANIA

The conference in Bucharest/Tulcea brought together representatives from four Commissions: Land Use/Cover Changes, Biodiversity, Health and Environment and Local and Regional Development. The rationale of the conference was to bring together scientists and stakeholders from various fields to address different effects of ecosystems changes, to set-up mitigation and adaptation strategies and contribute with scientific information to local/regional land use, planning and environmental policies. The topic of the conference focused on the relationships between ecosystems and socio-economic systems, the potential risks and benefits to regional specialization and human welfare. Participants discussed the problem on how human activities and global environmental changes affect terrestrial and freshwater ecosystems, human well-being and public health, what are the feedback and the potential local and regional futures.

The themes of the Commissions members presentation focus on the following topics: identification of local development factors with particular emphasis on demographic and settlement factors, spatial development inequalities in suburban areas, regional development potentials and barriers, the role of local authorities in the development of marginal areas, spatial relations and communication accessibility, environmental protection and extreme phenomena, the issue of ethnic minorities in a local context.

IGU Commission Seminar, Guwahati, INDIA

The conference gathered several hundred participants representing various subdisciplines of geography. The focal theme concentrated on environment and sustainable livelihood. Change is inevitable and the greatest challenge we face today is change in climate, environment, human migration, land use impacting livelihood, health and well-being. Development interventions aiming at more sustainable livelihood and sustainable resource management, must be informed by both an inner perspective and a perspective addressing the macro context with its impacts on livelihood, as it also refers to the challenges of food security and access to freshwater and energy, while land and water contribute to the healthy and sustainable management of the agricultural system, the role of forest cannot be underrated.

<u>Pre-conference meeting of IGU Commission on Local and Regional Development,</u> Kalamazoo, USA

The conference participants discussed the idea of difference in restructuring local and regional economic development. The discussion was taken into account the need to recognize and embrace the diversity of local and regional economies, restructuring issues, local and regional development approaches, and the stakeholder populations that are impacted by local and regional development efforts. The goal was to evaluate current notions and explore new ways of restructuring local and regional economies.
